



Introduction

Villa Barr is a recent addition to the Parks, Recreation and Cultural Services Department of the City of Novi, Michigan. The four-acre park, previously owned by David Barr and dancer Beth Dwaihy Barr, includes a home, studio and multiple sculpture installations in a park setting. David was fascinated by the natural world, dedicated to revealing things that nature creates but are easily overlooked.


This activity book was designed to introduce students to the Villa Barr Art Park, while growing their scientific and artistic skills through observation exercises, artistic activities, and more.





Leaf Scavenger Hunt Villa Barr Art Park


Challenge yourself to find and identify each of these leaves within this park. If you're having trouble, see species identification answers in the back of the booklet!

David and Beth Barr owned this property, prior to it becoming a park, and lived in the house you see near the entrance. This house was specially made for David, and it brings together many of the elements that he liked. is inspired his by style of art. called constructivism. It reflects his interest in geometry with straight lines that form rectangles and triangles. A spiral staircase connects the first floor with the main living space and deck on the second floor; these were built higher up to provide a beautiful view of the pond. gardens, and the sculptures throughout the day. He even made his studio part of the house. From the outside, you distinguish the living space with its angled can easily roof from the artist's studio with its flat roof.

What does home mean to you?

David and Beth made their house a **home.** They made it a place for their interests, passions and love of beauty. A house is a physical thing, but a home doesn't even have to be a building. It can be abstract, a place in your mind. Here's an old song by actor and poet John Howard Payne:

Creating At Villa Barr

David and Beth wanted to share their house and home in order to inspire others to create. Now artists from all over the country come here to live for a while and to create their own art. One of those artists was Shannon Tamura who created this sculpture Baby Your Dreams.

The woman's headdress is made from natural materials like **leaves**, **twigs** and **pine cones**. The bird she is holding is called a **Phoenix**. In ancient Greek Mythology, when a Phoenix dies it goes up in flames and then regenerates itself from the ashes. In *Harry Potter and the Order of the Phoenix* Dumbledore introduces Harry to the phoenix Fawkes.

Here is something to think about. Like the phoenix, trees and plants regenerate themselves from seeds. Artists do something even more powerful. They use their experience and imagination to generate something new—a work of art.

Using natural materials you find lying around Villa Barr, including pinecones, leaves, rocks, acorns, feathers, and more, create your own artwork.



"Baby Your Dreams" by Shannon Timura, artist in residence at Villa Barr. Inspired by the mythological Phoenix, this concrete maché sculpture of a woman holding a baby Phoenix represents how our dreams must be protected from the fires of daily life.

Keep in mind:

- -The artwork can be **realistic** or **abstract**. It can represent something that exists **physically**, or represent an **emotion** or **idea**.
- -Try using tape, glue, string, wire, or other materials to help you build your artwork
- -If you're having trouble making a 3D sculpture, try attaching leaves and grass onto a piece of paper to create an image.

David Barr and his wife Beth planted hundreds of trees around this park, many of which you'll see today. Each tree has something about it that makes it unique. Find a tree that you like and pick up one of its leaves.

In BOX #2 use the leaf to trace its edges on the paper. Then, draw in the veins and details. If your leaf doesn't fit in the box, then just trace a section of it.

BOX #2

You can create a **rubbing** of a leaf by placing a leaf on a hard surface. Now place a piece of paper on top of the leaf. Using the **side of an unwrapped crayon**, rub the paper over the leaf: the **textural details** of the leaf will appear on the paper.

Use this page to create rubbings for leaves you find. Get creative, what else can you create rubbings of? Grass? Bark? Rocks? Try it out here!

Artists and scientists learn to look very closely at things in nature. They sometimes see something that is not evident to others. For example, if you look very closely at the bottom of a pine cone you can see that the seeds spiral out from the center.

This kind of spiral occurs throughout nature. You can see it in snail shells, sun flowers, vine tendrils and even the spiraling shape of hurricanes.

These are called **logarithmic spirals**. They follow a pattern of numbers first identified by a 13th century mathematician named **Leonardo Fibonacci**. Learn more about these naturally occurring mathematical patterns by looking up information on the **Golden Mean**.








Relaxation Coloring Page: "Isaiah" (foreground) and "Bosque Urban" (background)


